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<u>September 12—Anniversary of Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary</u>

FYI—September 12 marks the third anniversary of the consecration of the diocese to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. As we look back on the fruits that this act has borne for our diocese and ourselves, it may be beneficial to remind parishioners of this important anniversary and take time to recall or even re-consecrate ourselves to our Blessed Mother and her Immaculate Heart. Immaculate Mary, meek and humble of heart. Conform our hearts to the heart of Jesus!

Catechetical Sunday 2023

This year, the Church will celebrate Catechetical Sunday on September 17, with the theme *Come to me all you who labor and are burdened*. Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. Those who the parish community has designated to serve as catechists may be called forth to be blessed for their ministry. Especially as we continue with the Eucharistic revival, recognizing and praying for the efforts of all catechists as they seek different and creative ways to provide formation on the Eucharist for the faithful is vitally important.

As in past years, a variety of materials, free of charge on-line, have been prepared to assist clergy, parish catechists, Catholic school teachers, and the faithful to celebrate Catechetical Sunday, not only in September but throughout 2023-2024. These can be found at the <u>USCCB Catechetical Sunday 2023</u> website.



In addition, chapter four of the *Book of Blessings* provides an "Order for the Blessing of Those Appointed as Catechists" that may be used in or outside of Mass. This could be used at the Masses on Catechetical Sunday weekend to publicly recognize those who have made the commitment to serve as catechists, as well as giving the faithful of the community the opportunity to publicly pray for and support those entrusted with this great work.

Lastly, please do not forget to recognize parents as the first teachers of children. The role which they play is essential, and our prayerful support of them is greatly needed and appreciated.

Feasts in October

While they may not be holy days of obligation, there are several additions to the liturgical calendar in October that deserve some special attention. The texts for their respective Masses and entries in the Lectionary and Liturgy of the Hours in English and Spanish (when available) can be found under "Mass" in the Worship section of the diocesan website:

October 3—Memorial (optional) of Saint Theordore Guérin, Virgin

Due to her impact on the Church here in southern Indiana, the optional Memorial of Saint Theodore Guérin was added in 2007 to the Proper Calendar for the Diocese of Evansville following her 2006 canonization. We can still see the fruits of her work here in the diocese today, especially in Catholic education.

October 5—Memorials (optional) of Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, Priest; and Saint Faustina Kowalska, Virgin

Born in Füssen, Germany in 1819, Blessed Francis entered the diocesan seminary and, coming to know the charism of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, joined it and was sent to North America. Ordained a priest in 1844, he began his pastoral ministry in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania as assistant pastor of his confrere Saint John Neumann, serving also as Master of Novices and dedicating himself to preaching. He became a full-time itinerant missionary preacher, preaching in both English and German in a number of different states. He died in New Orleans, Louisiana, on October 4, 1867. Due to his missionary zeal as well as continued devotion to him, especially in the south, Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos was added to the Proper Calendar for the Dioceses of the United States in 2014.

Born in Poland in 1905, Saint Faustina spent her short life amongst the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, conforming herself to the vocation she received from God and developing an intense spiritual life, rich in spiritual gifts and in faithful harmony with them. She became the inspiration for a movement dedicated to proclaiming and imploring Divine Mercy throughout the whole world. Canonized in the year 2000 by Pope Saint John Paul II, Faustina and her devotion to Divine Mercy quickly became known around the world. In 2020, Pope Francis ordered the inscription of Saint Faustina into the General Roman Calendar.

October 11—Memorial (optional) of Saint John XXIII, Pope

Pope Saint John XXIII was added to the General Roman Calendar in 2014. While most saints' feasts are their day of death, Pope Saint John XXIII is commemorated on the date of the opening of the Second Vatican Council, which he historically called.

October 22—Memorial (optional) of Saint John Paul II, Pope

Since this falls on a Sunday, Saint John Paul II is not celebrated liturgically in 2023. It would still be appropriate, however, to mention him in the Prayer of the Faithful or in the Eucharistic Prayers that include a mention of the saint of the day (EP III and "For Various Needs").

November 6—Anniversary of the Dedication of the Cathedral

On November 6 we celebrate the fourth anniversary of the dedication of Saint Benedict Cathedral. The anniversary of the dedication of a cathedral a proper Feast for the diocese, celebrating Saint Benedict as the diocesan church and the home of the bishop's cathedra. Masses this day should be taken from the Common of the Dedication of a Church: On the Anniversary of the Dedication: II. Outside the Church that was Dedicated. As a Feast the Gloria would be sung at Mass. Funeral Masses are permitted this day.

In the cathedral itself, the day is a Solemnity (as it would be for any other church's dedication anniversary). Along with the Gloria, two readings are proclaimed before the Gospel and the Creed is also said.

Color of Altar Cloth

Q.: What color should the altar cloth be? Does it need to match the color of the day?

A.: The altar is "the center of the thanksgiving that is accomplished through the Eucharist" (*General Instruction of the* Roman Missal [GIRM], no. 296), so it makes sense to pay attention to how the altar is covered and prepared.

According to the *General Instruction*, there should be "at least one cloth, white in color, whose shape, size, and decoration are in keeping with the altar's structure" (GIRM, no. 304). It goes on to say that if other cloths are used, they may be of other colors (usually the color of the liturgical season or feast), but the top cloth is always white.

From a sign standpoint, the altar is said to represent Christ (in the words of Saint Ambrose, "the altar is Christ."). Because of this, the white cloth has long symbolized the burial shroud of Christ. While other cloths may be used to ornament the altar, this uppermost reminder of Christ's Passion and death is not to be overlooked.

In addition, from a practical standpoint, this cloth can also help to keep stains from reaching the other cloths underneath, especially if nicer colored cloths are used. But this white cloth should be seen as the minimum needed.

Related to this point, the top white cloth is distinct from the corporal that is also placed on the altar for the celebration of Mass. Even if a large corporal is used that may cover most or all of the altar, it is still seen as separate from this white altar cloth.


